
# KALAMAZOO LOAVES & FISHES FOR THOUGHT Promoting a Hunger-Free Community Since 1982 OMAR'S STORY

For most people, there's an assumption that if you work hard and do your part to contribute to society, your efforts will be rewarded in the form of self-sufficiency. The long hours spent away from family are worth it when it means you'll earn enough to cover basic needs and have the ability to maintain a small savings. The reality is that, for many, long hours on the job don't provide enough to cover basic needs, and they find themselves on the constant verge of financial disaster. What's worse is when a temporary injury leaves someone struggling to makes ends meet unable to work at all. That's the reality Omar was faced with earlier this year.

"I've always worked hard, and it happened at the worst time," Omar solemnly shares. "I am also supporting another family member right now so we're both in a bind."

Omar lost his job when he found himself unable to work due to a back injury. As a result of losing his job, he was evicted from his apartment located within a senior retirement complex. He's saddened by the situation not only because he's left scrambling to find a new place to live, but also because he has always played by the rules.

"I paid taxes all my life. I don't drink or do drugs. I have no criminal record. I even have teaching credentials. This just feels so tragic," Omar says.



Despite feeling defeated, Omar didn't let his disappointment tarnish his work ethic, and he's very grateful for KLF's services. After months of living on the streets, he shares that receiving help with groceries has allowed him to put money towards the gas he needs to get to work and finally cover the security deposit for a new apartment.

Now working two jobs, he looks forward to leaving his situation behind him. Unfortunately, the feeling of financial uncertainly is a not-too-distant



## WHY SO MANY STRUGGLE TO MAKE ENDS MEET IN KALAMAZOO COUNTY

HUNGER IS AN UNFORTUNATE CONSEQUENCE OF POVERTY, AND FOR MANY KALAMAZOO COUNTY FAMILIES, MEETING BASIC NEEDS IS STILL AN UNATTAINABLE GOAL. HERE'S HOW WAGES STACK UP AGAINST THE COST OF LIVING IN KALMAZOO COUNTY.

The IRA Charitable Rollover provision allows individuals who have reached age 70½ to donate up to \$100,000 to charitable organizations directly from their Individual Retirement Account (IRA), without treating the distribution as taxable income. If married, each spouse can transfer up to \$100,000 from their IRA.

## **IT TAKES BOTH: FOOD + FUNDS**

Kalamazoo Loaves & Fishes can provide a four-day food supply for **less than three dollars**. Because of our pennies-on-the-pound purchasing power, we're able to stretch the funds you gift us to the max. We make a commitment to offering fresh produce, dairy, and meat in all of our pantries, which means we need to purchase those food items that aren't typically donated. During our last fiscal year, KLF secured 27% of our food through the wholesale market.

While the *monetary donations* we receive make it possible to continue our vital food programs and serve nearly 700 people per day, *food donations* allow us to provide variety within our 24 Grocery Pantry locations. Last fiscal year, 8% of our food came from communiy food drives and food donations. Food variety is key to meeting clients' needs in a way that respects their dignity. Clients are able to access food that allows them to maintain a diet based on their health, cultural, religious, or lifestyle needs.

Donations from our community (volunteer hours included) have always been the mighty force behind our mission. Whether you donate food, funds, time, or any combination of the three to our organization, know that they work in tandem to effectively carry out our mission and feed those experiencing hunger in our community.
