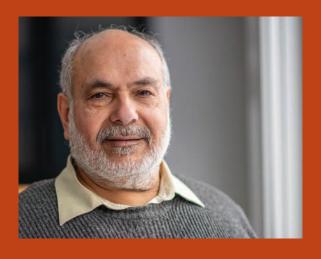
FOODFORTHOUGHT



MEET ANNA

Anna is pregnant with her second child. Due to complications with the pregnancy, she is on bed rest for several months. Because her employer did not offer any short-term disability benefits or FMLA, Anna had to quit her job. "Going from two incomes to one has been super hard," Anna shared. "My husband's job is pretty secure for now, but our budget was based on our combined salary." Her health issues prevent her from driving, so Anna was very grateful for KLF's delivery program. "We live in the country way outside of Kalamazoo and don't qualify for a lot of programs. KLF has helped so much!"



MEET ARTHUR

When Arthur drives up and greets our staff, he's ready with a list of the items he needs. "I don't want to take anything that someone else can use," Arthur insists. In his late 70s, Arthur still drives and lives on his own. His wife died five years ago, and Arthur has struggled since her passing. "We were married for over 40 years," Arthur says with a sad smile. "She took care of everything — cooking, shopping, and paying bills. I never realized how much work went into running this household — it's hard to keep it all straight." Arthur shares that he has lived on a very limited income since retirement. Getting some food items from KLF each month is helpful. We provide Arthur with contact information for Milestone Senior Services to get additional support for other areas of his life.



MEET KEYSHA

Keysha is in her mid 20s and works as a sales associate at a national chain clothing store. She has worked there for over three years, currently making \$10.65 per hour. Even though Keysha really likes her job, loves clothes, and enjoys helping customers, she is having a difficult time making ends meet. "My apartment is only 720 square feet with no frills, but my rent has increased to \$1,100 per month," Keysha shares. "How am I supposed to have anything left for food after that?!" Until the last few months, Keysha had only visited KLF once in 2016. "I'm looking for a part-time job to help bring in a little more cash. This food helps a lot while I am trying to find extra work."

A NOTE FROM JEN

We typically feature a special guest in this article; however, it seemed like a fitting opportunity to chat with our Executive Director, Jennifer Johnson. As we quickly approach the holiday season and reflect on our 40th year of service, it is truly a special time at KLF. — Greta M. Faworski, Associate Director

Q: Kalamazoo Loaves & Fishes started in 1982. When you think about 1982 compared to 2022, what is the same about KLF? What is different?

A: From the very start, KLF existed because volunteers, donors, community organizations and churches pooled resources to solve a complex issue. This is still very true today. Our founders believed in self-declaration of need, knowing that food insecurity can't always be determined through complicated income verifications and invasive questions. Everyone's story is different, and there are many families who earn above the poverty level, but still can't cover the basic cost of living in our area. What is quite different today is the scale to which we provide service. In 1982, KLF provided 6,000 food orders from the basement of a church. Last year, we provided over 100,000 food orders through a large warehouse and multiple trucks and vans. In 1982, our country was experiencing high inflation and facing a recession. Here we are again — the perfect storm brewing and reinforcing why an agency like KLF is so important in the community.

Q: What is next as KLF looks towards the future?

A: The most successful way to combat hunger is what we know as the food safety net. It's a combination of government programs, non-profit resources, and community support. Not one of these efforts, alone, will do it. We need to improve our child nutrition programs and remember how important daily access is for so many. We need to improve nutrition assistance for community members who are disabled or medically at-risk. We need to support legislation that incentivizes corporate and public giving. KLF must be at thefront of the line to break down barriers and dismantle systems of oppression. Finally, as a non-profit, we can't stop thinking innovatively about ways to reduce and eliminate hunger.

Q: Any final thoughts?

A: I can't tell you how fortunate I feel working for KLF. This agency that puts people first and looks at individual needs. That distinguishes between the person and their challenge. That believes everyone has the right to healthy, nutritious food. That has never waivered from its original intent of a community working together and pooling resources to help others and address a complex issue.











Three new Program Assistants have joined our team. **Heather Hageman** (full-time), **Allison Triplett** (part-time), and **Elias Fernandez** (part-time) will support our hunger-relief programs by building food orders in the pantry, scheduling appointments in the Call Center, and supporting walk-in clients. **Bryant Strong** is our newest Warehouse Assistant which will keep him busy unloading

food orders, delivering inventory to our pantries and partners, and helping with mobile food distributions.

Together they bring a wealth of experience and dedication and will help us carry out our mission each day.



IMPACT of Food Insecurity



Experiencing food insecurity, even for a short period of time, can have a wide and long-lasting impact. While each individual circumstance is different and influenced by a variety of factors, here are some of the most common effects:



CHILDREN AND TEENS

- Delayed or stunted physical and mental development.
- · Risk of chronic illnesses like asthma and anemia.
- Behavioral problems like hyperactivity, anxiety and aggression.
- Difficulty concentrating in school, which leads to poor performance and low self esteem.
- Life-long challenges that can result in lower productivity, fewer economic opportunities, and cyclical poverty.



ADULTS

- Need to make difficult decisions such as choosing between paying for food and heat, electricity, rent, and transportation.
- Increased chance of experiencing psychological issues ranging from stress, anxiety, and depression to more severe mental illness.
- Higher probability of chronic or acute health conditions resulting in higher healthcare expenses.
- Increased possibility of intimate partner violence due to stress and the psychological impact of food insecurity.



SENIORS

- Difficulty conducting daily activities such as personal hygiene, mobility, and living independently.
- Higher probability of chronic diseases including hypertension, coronary heart disease (CHD), hepatitis, stroke, cancer, asthma, diabetes, arthritis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), and kidney disease.
- 60% higher chance of experiencing depression than seniors who are food secure.
