Grocery Pantry Program

A typical food order through the Grocery Pantry Program (GPP) includes milk, bread, cereal, frozen meat, produce, and a selection of non-perishables. Orders are built to household size and with dietary allergies and restrictions in mind. Clients have the option of curbside pickup, in-person shopping, or home delivery. Clients can utilize the GPP 2x per month.

Weekend Food Pack Program/School-Based Pantries

Weekend food packs are designed to bridge the weekend food gap for youth who rely on school meal programs. Each pack provides approximately 2-3 meals to school-age youth. Food is kid-friendly and easily prepared. They are distributed to students on Fridays.

Mobile Food Distributions

Mobile food distributions are designed to provide 5-7 supplemental food items to families. We offer 14 regularly scheduled distributions each month.

No appointment is necessary, and this program can be used in conjunction with the Grocery Pantry Program.

Partner Agency Program

KLF partners with specific organizations to further connect with individuals facing food insecurity. Partner agencies have an allocation of food that they can receive from KLF to support their internal pantries and/or congregate meal programs. While all individuals can access KLF programs, they may be more comfortable and/or better served through partner agencies for a variety of reasons. Examples include WMU Invisible Need Program, El Concilio, KRESA, Generous Hands, and YWCA Domestic Assault Shelter.
